Vision First Theme

This World Sight Day, we're supporting the IAPB theme of 'Vision First' to draw attention to the work Orbis does around the world to **remove the barriers** people can face when trying to access quality eye care.

These barriers to eye care can take many forms – from a lack of awareness about eye disease, to the distance needed to travel to reach a service, to the cost of treatment. With 89% of blind and visually impaired people living in low- or middle-income countries, people often face a stark choice when it comes to weighing up the cost of seeking help for their vision loss, against every day essentials.

At Orbis, we're removing these barriers and bringing screenings and treatments closer to home for those who need it most – so that people are able to put vision first.

We do this through:

- → Our community outreach work, such as our Vision Van which brings optometrists and glasses to schools in Northern India
- → Training teachers to spot eye conditions in their pupils
- → Upskilling eye care teams across Africa, Asia and Latin America with the help of our amazing volunteers, both on board the Orbis Flying Eye Hospital and in local hospitals
- → Educating communities on eye health, so that they are aware of the services and free treatments available for their vision loss.

In 2018, Orbis UK supporters enabled us to work with local partners to conduct over three million screenings, deliver almost 332,500 surgeries and medical treatments and supply just under 8.4 million doses of Zithromax to prevent and treat blinding trachoma. In addition to this, we were able to train almost 59.5k doctors, nurses and community health workers.


